WORDS FROM STAR's BOARD PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Some days it feels like we have weathered a dark storm only to find that our lives are colored by a rainbow of new opportunities as we, hopefully, see the waning of the pandemic. Thanks to the extraordinary efforts of our Direct Care Professionals, the flexibility and cooperation of our families, the generosity of our donors and volunteers, and the positive spirit and energy of our participants, STAR is focused on the future—and it is colorful and bright.

Individualized employment remains a primary focus, with nearly all of the individuals displaced during the pandemic returning to work. In addition, young adults entering the work force for the first time are finding new opportunities with STAR supports.

This past year has seen the near completion of our extensive renovation of STAR Headquarters in Norwalk thanks to series of grants from the Governor's Nonprofit Grant Program. Our Seniors Program relocated from St. Peters Church to a spacious new suite in the renovated building complete with access to a kitchenette, sensory room, nurses' station, and state-of-the-art accessible bathrooms and changing rooms. Young adults still discovering their talents and dreams, now enjoy dedicated space for art classes, dance, music, fitness, and gardening with a new assistive technology resource center soon to follow.

STAR Rubino Family Center is reinvigorated with the return of infants, toddlers and children up to age eight receiving direct therapy from our professionals. STAR now proudly accepts insurance, private pay, and HUSKY for

speech, occupational therapy, physical therapy and special education.

Residential services continue paying close attention to COVID protocols to protect residents and staff. A new group residence in Norwalk was developed to replace an aging home owned by the state. Five residents now enjoy a fully accessible and completely renovated home. We began the conversion of the Darien Cottage into a Smart Home showcase with assistive technology generously funded by a grant from The Darien Foundation. Likewise, we began adding smart technology to a handful of other homes as the direction of the future to foster greater independence, safety, and accessibility.

Finally, we continued our amazing series of daily zoom classes to keep everyone engaged and connected, particularly those who are not yet able to return to inperson services. With the help of dozens of community partners and volunteers, the rich content of the classes continues to inspire and amaze. We are so grateful for our many community partners.

It was a proud year for STAR. We faced the hurdles as a team and became stronger and smarter with each one. We celebrate individual triumphs and believe it is truly a colorful life!

Little STARs, Bright Futures!

Meet Skylev!

Skyler just turned three, recently started school and took the bus! These milestones, celebrated by his mother Kirsten and father Mike, are extra special for a child with cerebral palsy. Skyler was referred to STAR Rubino Family Center at six months— "A Lucky meeting," shared Kirsten, "We were so thankful to get in touch with STAR Rubino Family Center and to receive such great support right away. We credit Skyler's progress to the STAR therapists." In fact, it was STAR's therapist who originally suggested that Skyler was presenting like he had cerebral palsy when the family was unsure what was going on. "We felt like he was an infant forever, lacking head support, trunk support, and mobility."

"STAR showed us, and Skyler, what he can do. That brings us lots of joy." He was matched up with the right equipment to move and now can participate in life. "Putting him on the bus by himself at three with his paraprofessional brought tears to my eyes. The fact that he is going to a school with typical kids and that he can be part of that experience is a huge thing for our family."

Prior to meeting STAR, Skyler had no diagnosis. He was developmentally delayed, had difficulty feeding, and used a gastrointestinal tube. He receives four services from STAR including speech (sound production and feeding therapies),

physical, occupational therapy (learning to move his body), and special education (cognitive exercises to learn colors and shapes).

Through COVID, STAR professional therapists made up to five house visits weekly and quickly worked out video conferencing that gave the family more "Hands on" for therapy support. Kirsten expressed, "It takes a very special person to teach through video conference!" Dad is also very involved in the therapy and exercises. He is building a special bench with monkey bars and a vibration plate to help

a special bench with monkey bars and a vibration plate to help Skyler strengthen his bones and improve mobility. In addition to support from family and friends, Kirsten said, "STAR has been my therapist and go-to resource. STAR supports our whole family."

"Skyler is still nonverbal, he tries so hard with everything he does." says his dad. "He is learning animal sounds and you can see how hard he tires to position his lips and produce a sound." The parents hope that Skyler will learn how to operate a motorized wheelchair in the next year to increase his independence. They believe, with eye gaze devices and new assistive technology, that Skyler will thrive and enjoy a life connecting to others and contributing to the community.

Meet Ariana!

atrick and Carolina are young and dedicated parents focused on the well-being of their two-year-old daughter, Ariana. They live in Norwalk alongside their dog Crypto and cat Kiki. Following a normal delivery at birth, Ariana was diagnosed with congenital muscular torticollis, a medical condition involving stiff neck muscles which cause the head to tilt and lean more preferably in one direction. This made interacting with her environment and reaching her developmental milestones more difficult. Infants with this condition also have a high likelihood of developing plagiocephaly aka "Flat Head," which she also developed. To correct her torticollis, Ariana started to receive physical therapy, and to correct her plagiocephaly Ariana wore a cranial helmet 23 hours a day from 5 months old until she was 14 months. After overcoming those obstacles,

Ariana was recently diagnosed with autism in June 2021.

Ariana was referred to STAR Rubino Family Center at just five months old. Patrick said he and his wife "Really, really liked all the attention of the STAR therapists and the proximity to their home." In fact, they attribute the astuteness of STAR's physical and speech therapists, who throughout her therapy sessions, started to recognize Ariana's autism symptoms prior to her diagnosis. This energetic little girl who loves Peppa Pig, Elmo, and most of all her two pets; joins her parents at STAR Rubino Center several times weekly for speech, physical and occupational therapy. Dad shares that Ariana started walking this year on May 15 — a milestone that adds to one of his proudest moments, while Mom shares Ariana's first time being able to turn around on her tummy, or finally saying "mommy" as hers.

Self-Advocates

At three months of age, **Phyllis** and her twin brother became wards of the state due to dire family circumstances. After a few years, she returned to her father until, at age six, Phyllis remembers being dropped off at Southbury Training School (an institution that is still open in CT despite its decreasing population) because of her father's declining health. With four brothers and two sisters, Phyllis could not understand why she, the youngest child, had to leave her family and her twin brother. She spent eight years at the institution and recalls staff members saying, "You don't belong here." She recounts haunting memories of her time there that still bring a tear to her eye over six decades later. She remembers teaching herself how to write, spell and read. During that time, both of her parents died.

In June of 2021, Phyllis moved in to Stoler House at STAR after her previous group home in Torrington, CT closed. For Phyllis, her new room at STAR was love at first sight. She selected new furniture and had the room painted her favorite indigo blue with orange accents and floral curtains. With heartfelt sincerity, Phyllis says she "Loves, loves" her staff, her housemates, her visits to the horse farm, dances, the STAR Senior Center, and all of "The beautiful people I meet at STAR."

Phyllis readily shares her age of 73 and happily recounts her years working in the Danbury Hospital kitchen, hotel housekeeping, assembly, and lawn care. Phyllis is an avid swimmer and competed for many years in Special Olympics. She is proud of her son and grandson who she visits in New York State as often as possible, "spoiling her grandson with gifts and money." Phyllis has a lot of friends and relatives on Facebook and she loves to stay connected. She enjoys crossword puzzles and embroidery. Her next dream job or volunteer opportunity is to read to kids. "I love kids." The staff at Stoler House attest to the rapid friendships Phyllis made in her new home. They describe her as very "industrious and helpful," as she assists with preparing lunches and meals while offering support to her housemates. "She is a real girls' girl, too! She is very particular about her hair and nails. She says she is 'Forever Young'."

Phyllis is one of over 90 people who receive residential supports from STAR's Direct Care Professionals. During COVID, these professionals are heroes whose dedication and compassion lead them to fulfill their mission of keeping the residents safe, healthy, engaged and connected despite often overwhelming challenges.
